





The number of jaywalking cases has increased. The figures went up from 1,758 last year to 2,409 this year. Police statistics revealed that 44 pedestrians were killed while crossing the road in 2013, and the number was 49 the year before.

"Pedestrians are a vulnerable group of road users. They are likely to sustain serious or fatal injuries if they are involved in a traffic accident. Hence, they must never attempt to 5 jaywalk," said Officer Lam, a police spokesman.

To avoid unwanted incidents, both pedestrians and motorists have to play their part "As co-users of the road, both parties bear equal responsibility for their safety," commented Mr Menon, a road safety expert.

A recent shocking newspaper report on a high-profile road tragedy has shone the spotlight on traffic safety here. The Straits Times spent two days observing traffic at 20 junctions and crossings across the island. Out of more than 5,000 pedestrians observed, close to 500 of them were spotted jaywalking. This translates to 1 out of 10 pedestrians jaywalking. The Straits Times also observed that besides jaywalking, other road safety hazards include risky behaviour of parents and children, pedestrians being distracted by their mobile phones and cyclists crossing the road without dismounting.

Road safety is a shared responsibility. Both pedestrians and motorists must play their respective parts to ensure the safety of all road users.
