



The world's first postage stamps were issued by Great Britain on 1 May 1840 and people started using them five days later. They were introduced by an ex-schoolteacher called Rowland Hill. He produced a plan to reform the Post Office and succeeded in getting the plan adopted in 1839.

Before 1840, the postage on a letter was usually paid by the person who 5 received it and charged according to its weight. As the cost of postage was very high, some people, especially the very poor, used to dread a visit from the postman.

The high charges were caused by the inefficient working of the Post Office. Rowland Hill's plan showed that letters could be sent all over the country 10 for a fraction of the charges, and still enable the Post Office to make a good profit. So as to make the sender responsible for the postage, Hill suggested that it should be paid in advance by sticking a stamp to a letter.

There were two values of stamps: The Penny Black and the Twopenny Blue with both showing the head of Queen Victoria. They were printed in London 15 in sheets of 240 stamps without perforations. Although these stamps are not very rare, they are in great demand by collectors.

Two years after Britain had introduced postage stamps to the world, a private postal service in New York issued a stamp. Other issues by postmasters in the United States were made over the next few years. In 1847, came the first 20 stamps for use throughout the USA. They were the Five Cents Brown showing Benjamin Franklin and the Ten Cents Black showing George Washington.

In the meantime, the Swiss canton of Zurich brought out two stamps the four and the six 'rappen'. Then from Geneva came a curious stamp: it was in
two halves. To post an ordinary letter, only one half needed to be affixed. This 25
stamp is known to collectors as 'The double Geneva'.

It was, however, Basle who issued the first multi-coloured stamp in July 1845. This stamp showed a white dove on a red background with pale blue comers.
