



In 2005, researchers travelled to Panama on a rescue mission. The invasive chytrid (16) fungus had been found in the country's mountains, threatening to eliminate entire (17) populations of amphibians. Biologists loaded hundreds of frogs into crates, including several dozens of rare Rabbs' fringe-limbed tree frogs and tadpoles, to safequard them in U.S. labs.

Now, only one Rabbs' frog remains. The others died of natural causes and new tadpoles were never able to fully metamorphose in the labs. The last Rabbs' frog, (19) nicknamed Toughie by his caretakers, lives inside a biosecure shipping container with various other frog species. He is fed a diet of crickets and is weighed but otherwise touched sparingly. Although Toughie is healthy, researchers believe he is also old.

A loosened cover on a Downtown Line (DTL) train's detrainment switch was what caused Singapore's newest MRT-line's second disruption in less than a week. Downtown Line operator SBS Transit reportedly said at a press confference on Saturday that the switch was believed to be triggered with a young girl who moved the metal cover that concealed it, triggering a cut in the power supply, an in-built safety feature, and the deployment of a ramp for emergency evekuation. Friday night's disruption lasted about 40 minutes, from around 9.34pm to 10.14pm, according to SBS Transit. However, they resulted in a halt in service for more than an hour, according to other local media reports. The company said it had since enhanced its switch covers "for a tighter fit" on all its DTL trains, adding that it has stationed staff at both ends of its trains to prevent repeat inscedents. "At about 9pm, there was a power fault affecting the Downtown Line, 50 passengers on (45)one train was detrained at Bayfront Station. Full service resumed at 10.10pm. We apologise to (46)all commuters for the inkonveneince caused," said Tammy Tan, SBS Transit Senior Vice President of corporate communications.

The passengers on the bus watched sympathetically as the young woman with the white cane made her way carefully up the steps. She paid the driver and, using her hands to feel the location of the seats, walked down the aisle and found the seat he had told her was empty. She settled in and rested her cane against her leg.

It had been a year since Safiya became blind due to a medical misdiagnosis. She was suddenly thrown into a world of darkness, anger, frustration and self-pity. Once a fiercely independent woman, Safiya now felt powerless, a helpless burden on everyone around her. No matter how much she cried or ranted, she knew her sight was never going to return. Just getting through each day was an exercise in frustration and exhaustion. All she had to cling on to was her husband, Meraj.

Meraj was an Air Force officer. A determined man, he had made up his mind to help his wife regain the strength and confidence to become independent again. He knew that was the most daunting task he would ever face.

Soon Safiya felt ready to return to her job, but how would she get there? She used to take the bus but was now too frightened to get around the city by herself.

Meraj volunteered to drive her to work each day even though they worked at opposite ends of the city.

This comforted Safiya and fulfilled Meraj's need to protect his sightless wife who was so insecure about performing the slightest task. Soon, however, Meraj realized that the arrangement was not working - it was hectic, and costly. Safiya had to start taking the bus again. How would she react to such a suggestion?

Just as Meraj predicted, Safiya was horrified at the idea of taking the bus again. "I am blind!" she responded bitterly. "How am I supposed to know where I am going? I feel like you are abandoning me."

Meraj was heartbroken. He promised Safiya that he would ride the bus with her until she got the hang of it. For two weeks, Meraj accompanied Safiya to and from work each day. He taught her how to rely on her other senses, specifically her hearing, to determine where she was and how to adapt to her new environment.

Meraj helped her befriend the bus drivers who could watch out for her and save 30 her a seat. Each morning, they made the journey together and Meraj would take a cab back to his office. Although this routine was more costly and exhausting than the previous one, Meraj knew it was only a matter of time before Safiya became independent again.

Finally with the overwhelming support and encouragement from her husband, Safiya decided that she was ready to try the trip on her own. Monday morning arrived and for the first time, they went their separate ways.

One Friday morning, Safiya took the bus to work as usual. As she was paying for her fare to exit the bus, the driver said, "I envy you. It must feel so good to be taken care of and protected like you are."

Safiya had no idea what the driver was talking about and questioned him curiously.

The driver answered, "Every morning for the past week, a gentleman has been standing across the corner watching you when you get off the bus. He makes sure you cross the street safely and watches you until you enter your office building. Then he blows you a kiss and walks away. You are one lucky woman."

Tears of happiness poured down Safiya's cheeks. Although she could not physically see him, she had always felt Meraj's presence. Safiya was lucky for he had given her a gift more powerful than sight, a gift she did not need to see to believe.
