



After an early breakfast, I sent four men down to Mohan to bring up two buffaloes. Meanwhile, I set off to inspect the ground where the woman had been killed. From the direction I had received, I had no difficulty in finding the spot where the maneater had attacked and killed the woman.

There were two bundles of grass left behind by her companions, when they had run off in fright to the village. The men had told me that the body of the woman had not been found. However, from the fact that three perfectly good lengths of rope and the dead woman's sickle had been left in the jungle as they had been, it was more likely that no attempt had been made to find her. The villagers were afraid that the same thing would happen to them.

The woman had been killed at the upper end of a small landslide and the maneater had taken her down the slide and into a thick patch of grass. Here it had waited, possibly to give the other two women time to get out of sight, before it brought its kill straight down the hill into the thick jungle. The tracks were now four days old, and as there was nothing to be gained by following them further, I turned back to the hut.

The men had not returned from Mohan with the buffaloes, so I could not place them in the jungle as I had planned. Therefore after lunch, I set out again to have another look. I had the whole afternoon before me, and examined about three miles of the road very carefully.

Although the road I was on was overgrown with short stiff grass, I could still make out several important clues left by the man-eater. I found several scratch marks just round the corner where the road turned. Then on the top of a nearby ridge were more scratch marks, but I did not find any paw prints until I got to the first hairpin bend. Here, in cutting the bend, the striped beast had left its tracks when it jumped down onto some soft earth. The tracks, which were a day old, were a little distorted, but even so, it was possible to see that they had been made by a big, old, male wild beast.
