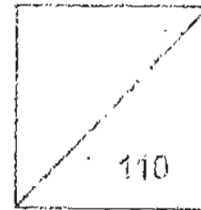

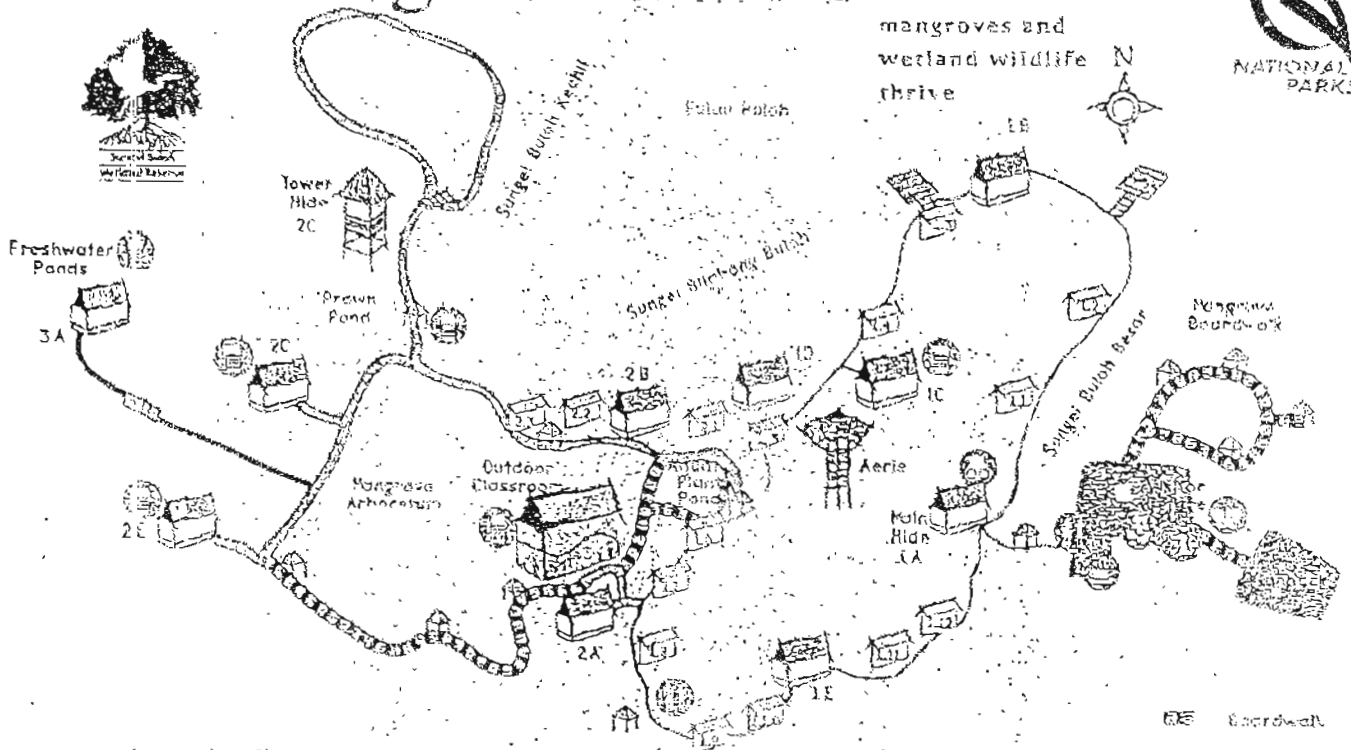

Steve's supporters surrounded him in a compact group when we were all gathered behind the big stump in Jackson's paddock.

Before Steve and I sat down opposite each other, Steve took off his coat, rolled up his shirt sleeves and spat on his hands. This impressed everybody except Maggie who thought he was showing off.

I did not take off my coat because my shirt had a lot of holes in it and I did not want Maggie to see them. However, I spat on my hands just to show I knew it was the right thing to do. Then I folded my legs beneath me and swung the stick through the air as if I were Mr Tucker swishing his cane.

After Steve finished spitting on his hands, he sat opposite me, out of reach of my stick, so they made him come closer. I reached out my stick to see if I could reach his head and I could easily, so I said I was set. Steve said he was set, too. Then Freddie gave his final instructions. "Remember," he said, "nobody is to tell old Tucker about this."

Everybody promised not to tell old Tucker. Then Freddie said, "Into it," and Steve hit me on the head with his stick. It landed on my hair and skidded down my cheek taking skin with it and was so completely unexpected that he hit me a second time on the shoulder before I finally realised we had started.

The blows I then delivered were inspired by a terrific rage and would have stopped a bull, so Maggie said. Steve fell backwards to escape them and I threw myself forward and hit him repeatedly as he tried to roll away. His nose was bleeding and he let out such a bawl of pain that I stopped in indecision but Freddie cried, "Finish him off," and I began again, crying out between each blow, "Have you had enough? Have you had enough?" until, between his howls I heard him cry, "Yes."

Joe was standing beside me with my crutches and Freddie helped me up on to them and I was trembling like a young horse. My face was stinging and painful to touch and a lump was growing on my head. I beat him. I said, "Didn't I?"

"You knocked the fog out of him," said Maggie, then added, leaning anxiously towards me, "How's your bad leg?"
