"I just cook for the fun of it," says Lana Gardner, a twelve-year-old who lives in New York City. "When I grow up, I want to be an architect." Her grandfather adds, "But an architect who knows how to cook."

Her grandfather is the well-known chef Clive Bricks who operates the Three Swans Restaurant. He is also the author of many cookbooks. His most recent is Children in the Kitchen, a guidebook for teaching children how to cook. Bricks says the idea for the book came from his granddaughters.

"It's fun following recipes and seeing how things come out. And it's fun to eat what you make," says Lana. "My grandfather is a wonderful cook and he's very patient with me. He taught my mother and my older sister how to cook when they were the same age as me."

"Yes, that's right," Mr Bricks says. "Her mother sent Lana to me when she first showed an interest in cooking. I'm trying to show her how to prepare some basic recipes and some of our family favourities."

"Yes," Lana says excitedly. "Our family has this great recipe for chicken vegetable soup. We usually make it for special occasions, but it's so good we make it at other times too."

Lana starts to explain the recipe. "It's not too difficult to make, out it has to cook for about three hours," she says. "I begin by washing my hands so that they're clean before I touch any food."

"Cleanliness is next to godliness," says her grandfather.

"Then," continues Lana, "I wash a whole chicken and have it cut up into pieces. Grandpa helps me do this, Then I prepare the vegetables. I cut off the ends of the opions, celery and carrots first and then cut them into small pieces. With the tomato, I have to cut out the hard, middle part. I break the parsiey into small pieces after cutting off the bottoms. They all go into the soup. I like to add a little salt and pepper and other seasoning at the beginning so that it all cooks together. Then I fill the pot with enough water to cover the ingredients. It all simmers over medium heat until it's ready, about three hours."

While the soup is cooking, Lana and her grandfather like to talk.

Lana arinks tea and her grandfather drinks coffee. Sometimes they play cards. Lana usually wins.

"I think my grandfather and I have a special relationship. We like cooking together. If you're really close to a person, you get even closer just by preparing a meal together."

Grandpa Bricks smiles as he hears Lana's words. "When it comes to cooking," he says, "there's ho generation gap between us."

"Besides," sne goes on, "Grandpa's a great teacher. He teaches a lot of people to cook."
