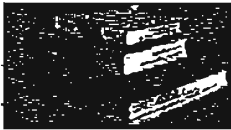

I followed, as fast as I could, but was brought to a halt by a fresh outburst of violent bellowing just ahead. I felt uneasy as I penetrated the thick bush, fearing that at any moment the massive shape of an enraged elephant would break through and squash everything in its path. I stopped and asked George not to go on, but nothing could deter him and he disappeared behind the trees. Next, I heard an ear-splitting scream followed by urgent shouts from George. As I stumbled as fast as I could through the thicket, terrible scenes flashed through my mind, but soon as I saw George's sunburnt back through the foliage; he was standing upright. 20

I ran across a faded photograph of him the other day while going through some old things. He had been dead about forty years. His name was Rex. "An American bull terrier," we used to say proudly. He was white except for a patch on his left eye.

Nevertheless, there was a nobility about him. He was big, muscular and beautifully made. He never lost his dignity even when trying to accomplish the daunting tasks my brothers and I used to set for him. One of these was the bringing of a two-metre wooden rail into the yard through the back gate. We would throw it out into the alley and tell him to go get it. Rex was as powerful as a wrestler, and there were not too many things that he could not manage with his great jaws. He could lift or drag the things to wherever he wanted to put them, or **wherever we wanted to put them**. Of course, since the gate was only one metre wide or so, he could not bring the rail in broadside. He found that out when he got a few terrific jobs, but he would not give up. He finally figured out how to do it by dragging the rail from one end.

He derived great satisfaction out of his work. We used to invite kids to see Rex in action. He could catch a baseball thrown as high as they could throw it. He almost never let us down.

He was a tremendous fighter, but he never started fights. His longest fight lasted from dusk until almost pitch-dark, one Sunday. It was fought on a busy road with a large, snarly nondescript that belonged to a big man. When Rex finally got his ear grip, the snarling turned to screeching. It was frightening to listen and to watch. The man picked the dogs up somehow and began swinging them around his head, and finally let them fly like a discus. Although they landed ten feet away in a heap, Rex still held on.

The two dogs eventually worked their way to the middle of a road. After a while, two or three cars were held up by the fight. **A burly man tried to pry Rex's jaw open with a rod; somebody lighted a fire and made a torch and held it to Rex's tail, but he paid no attention.** In the end, all the residents and storekeepers in the neighbourhood were at the scene shouting this and suggesting that.

Rex had a kind of pleasant expression during fights, not a vicious one. His eyes were closed in what seemed to be sleep had it not been for the turmoil of the struggle. The Fire Department had to be sent for. A powerful stream of water was turned on the dogs. Rex held on for several moments more before he finally let go.
