

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My mother's favourite entertainment was to attend bangsawan performances in the evenings whenever a Malay drama group happened to be in town. The traditional bangsawan was usually a play about legendary kings and queens. The stage was bare except for the backdrops indicating a palace or a street or a jungle, but the actors and actresses wore gorgeous costumes.

As a child, I was spellbound by the bangsawan which always began explosively with a loud firecracker as the curtains rose and the drama began.

My mother had a large circle of friends who visited her frequently to gossip. As she could not read, this was her favourite pastime apart from buying jewellery and disciplining her children. She was very strict with me, my sister, and later my brother, using the cane quite liberally to chastise us. My father never laid a finger on us. He disliked corporal punishment and rescued us from my mother whenever he could. Unfortunately, he was often away at work for weeks at a time as his road-building duties required him to travel long distances far from the town. He was the first man to survey a route across the Malay Peninsula from Kuala Lumpur to Kuantan through the mountains and jungles.

It was while he was on this job in 1926 that the great flood of the year deluged Malaya. It is well known that the East Coast is subject to annual flooding when the North-East Monsoon blows across the South China Sea from October to March. But the great flood of 1926 was the worst ever and my family had to evacuate our bungalow, splashing through chest-high floodwaters to reach higher ground. To this day the rest-house in Kuala Lipis has the high watermark of the flood drawn near the ceiling.

Rumours had it that my father and his team of workers were either 25 drowned or eaten by tigers in the forest, but they survived on the mountain. It was weeks before the survey team, led by my father, emerged from the jungle. My father knew the jungle well and was so at home in it that even after his retirement, he used to march off into the Cameron Highlands forest a whole day at a time. I accompanied him once - and only once - as climbing up damp, slippery slopes and contending with leeches was too much for me. I kept out of sight whenever he planned to go trekking into the woods, pretending to be busy with my studies.
