



The word 'mummy' is generally believed to derive from a Persian word, mummiya, meaning 'bitumen', used to describe the blackened state of ancient Egyptian bodies. The term is now generally applied to all human remains which retain their soft tissue, either by natural means or artificial preservation.

Mummification can be found on every continent of the world. But the 5 process itself is inextricably linked with the culture of ancient Egypt and for many, the world 'mummy' is synonymous with Egypt itself.

In popular fiction, mummies were reduced to little more than bandaged corpses with arms outstretched as they staggered towards some helpless victim. 49 Actually, these totally fascinating, wonderful 'artefacts' were once living people, to and preserving them in as lifelike a way as possible was actually regarded as a way of providing a permanent home for the soul whilst cheating death itself.

In ancient Egypt, mummification was very much in vogue and hairdressers and beauticians were even called in to restore a groomed, lifelike appearance! #5 Covered in a range of protective amulets and placed in its coffin, elaborate 15 funeral ceremonies designed to reactivate the soul within the mummy were accompanied by the words 'You will live again for ever. Behold, you are young again for ever', before the mummy was buried with generous supplies of food, drink and everything the soul of the deceased would need for a comfortable 29 afterlife.

The Egyptians buried their dead in the great expanses of desert away from the cultivation on the banks of the River Nile, but whereas the wealthy were artificially mummified and placed in specially built tombs, the majority were simply buried in hollows in the sand.

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Small groups of children stood about like strangers in the playground. There was little of the charging about and booting of balls that went on during most playtimes and before school. On the first day of the school year, everyone was slightly apprehensive. The new fourth-years, now the senior group, showed the most activity, greeting one another with loud shouts and over-enthusiastic thumps on the back. The rest were very quiet, adjusting to being back in school at all, and taking care of new trousers and frocks. But the quietest clusters of all, here and there attended by older brothers, sisters and the occasional mum, were the new first-years, last year's top infants who were now very much at the bottom of the pile. They resembled young deer on the edge of the herd, unsure and frightened but with heads held high.

Every so often a teacher walked through the playground, to be greeted in varying fashions by the different groups. The new fourth-year children rarely spoke to other than fourth-year teachers, whom they greeted with loud and polite explosions of welcome and wide smiles. There were two or three new young teachers, ignored by all but the few children who rushed to talk to any adult, and both popular and unpopular teachers who walked through to clamorous attention or to total disregard. Mr Bryan was mobbed from gate to steps by all but the fourth-years, while Mr Henry might as well have been walking across a beach at midnight. Mr Roper was already in the building, having been welcomed shortly after eight o'clock by a few shivering individuals whose parents had gone to work early and turned them out at the same time.

Class members greeted each other after the six-week break in different ways. Some had seen a lot of their particular friends in the holiday, and there was not much new to say. Others, not living so close together, welcomed their classmates with restrained delight, everyone talking and no one listening. Nobody spoke to Shemem Parveen, the brightly-clad Pakistani girl, nobody ever did. Paul Wicks, the football captain who held a place in the District Side even in his third year, was met on all sides by warm disciples. Groups of friends, who played together for different reasons, were reunited. The older children who often went out for dinner together, formed a tight band, allowing in a few of the sandwich-bringers as hangers on. Children who went home to dinner made up their own gangs, and those who lived near to one another, or who crossed the road together with the lollipop man, somehow stuck together in the playground. All sorts of reasons brought different children together.

Little notice was taken of anyone's colour; a good brain, a talented right foot or netball arm were what seemed to matter. The exceptions were the few Asian children who spoke poor English. They talked together in a fast foreign language by the school steps. The middle of the playground was not for them.
