<p>Metro Manila alone has about 85,000 street children. Street children eke out a living on the streets by weaving through traffic to beg or to sell cigarettes and candies to drivers and commuters. Others help commuters park and offer to "watch your car" for loose change.</p>	
<p>Their meagre earnings are primarily spent on food, but extra money is sometimes wasted on vices like gambling, drinking alcohol or sniffing glue.</p>	5
<p>In order to help these children spend wisely and teach them how to save with meaningful goals in mind, Childhope has started the Financial Education Programme (FEP). It targets those within the 14 to 18 age bracket. Later, it lowered its scope to include 12-year-olds to accommodate interested younger children.</p>	
<p>Sometimes, the problem is not about not knowing how to save. "They may not know there is an economic crisis going on in the world, but they definitely feel the surge in prices of food and basic goods. They had a hard time saving in 2009," explains Darwin Anolin, coordinator of Childhope's FEP.</p>	10
<p>At the end of each day, street children turn over their savings to area-based street educators, who record all the transactions. To withdraw money, the children have to submit in writing the amount they need and the reason for the planned withdrawal. Those who can maintain good records or have the highest savings each week are given incentives in the form of clothes or basic supplies.</p>	15
<p>"The programme is good because our money's not just lying around where we or anyone else can easily get it," says Adan. For Adan, his savings are a measure of his financial independence. He is not obligated to give money to his parents, but does so voluntarily while still keeping something for himself.</p>	20
<p>Teaching street children to save for the rainy days is just the first step. Childhope also helps beneficiaries of the FEP to find a more stable source of income instead of what they are doing on the streets. Vocational courses in cosmetology, reflexology and restaurant services are offered to street children who consistently save to move them away from a hand-to-mouth existence. Anolin says one former street child who has graduated from the course has been able to set up her own small burger stand business.</p>	25
<p>Since starting the programme in 1997, Childhope has helped 90 children manage their own finances. There are currently 50 active savers who deposit an average of 20 pesos each day.</p>	30

Not long ago, I spent the morning having coffee with Kanzi. It was not my idea; Kanzi invited me, though he did so in his customary clipped way. Kanzi was a fellow of few words – about four hundred by formal count though he probably knew a dozen more. He had a perfectly serviceable voice – very clear, very expressive and very, very loud. However it was not especially good for forming words which is the way of things when you are a bonobo, a close cousin of the chimpanzee.

However, Kanzi was talkative all the same. For much of his day he kept a sort of a glossary at hand. It consisted of three laminated, placemat-like sheets filled with hundreds of colourful symbols that represented all the words he had been taught by his trainers or picked up on his own. He could build thoughts and sentences, even conjugate, all by pointing. The sheets included not just easy nouns and verbs like "ball" and "run", but also concept words such as "from" and "later" and grammatical elements such as –ing and –ed endings signifying tenses. He was also able to build new ideas from old ones. For instance, to request for pizza which was not yet on the word list, Kanzi would point "bread", "cheese" and "tomato".

Kanzi certainly knew the value of breaking the ice before getting down to business. Hence he pointed to the coffee icon on his glossary and then pointed to me. He then swept his arms wider, taking in primatologist, Sue, and lab supervisor, Tyler. Quickly, Tyler fetched four cups of coffee, took one to Kanzi in his patio enclosure on the other side of a window and then rejoined us. Kanzi gulped down his cup of coffee and since our voices were picked up by microphones, he listened as we talked.

"We told him that a visitor was coming. He's been excited but he was stubborn this morning and we couldn't get him to come out to the yard. Instead, he pointed to the glossary for 'green', 'yellow' and 'watermelon'. Hence, we had to negotiate a piece of honeydew melon in exchange," Sue told me.

All the same, Kanzi was not interested in saying much that day, preferring to run and leap, displaying his physical prowess instead. "Ball", he tapped on one of his glossary sheets when he finished his coffee. "Tell him you'll get it for him," Sue instructed me and then showed me where the necessary symbols were on the sheet I had in hand. "Yes-I-will-chase-the-ball-for-you," I pointed at the symbols slowly. It took me a while to find the ball down the hall and when I finally returned, Sue picked up the ball and asked him verbally, "Are you ready to play?" Kanzi looked at us balefully. "Past ready," he pointed.

The non-profit Great Ape Trust was home to seven bonobos, including Kanzi's baby son, Teco. Kanzi was by no means the first ape to have been taught language. The famous Koko, Washoe and others came before him. Just as human mothers take babies on walks and chatter to them about what they see even though the child does not yet understand, so too do the scientists at the Trust narrate the lives of the bonobos. With this total immersion, the apes are learning to communicate better, faster and with greater complexity.

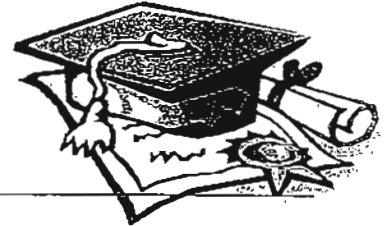
