Some Native Americans thought a giant sea turtle held up the earth. They believed that when the turtle moved, the earth moved. When the turtle moved more, the earth moved more, causing cracks in the earth's surface.

In India, it was believed that four elephants held up the earth. They stood on the back of a mountain tortoise. The mountain tortoise, in turn, balanced on the back of a snake. If any of these animals moved, the earth would shake and cause an earthquake. The greater the animal's movement, the greater the earthquake.

The ancient Greeks thought earthquakes showed the gods' wrath. A giant, named Atlas, had rebelled against the gods. As punishment, he had to hold the world on his shoulders. The Greeks believed that anytime Atlas adjusted the earth's weight on his shoulders, an earthquake followed. When Hercules sought Atlas' help to get the golden apples, Atlas agreed on the condition that Hercules carried the world for him. When Atlas returned with the apples, he told Hercules he was tired of holding the world so Hercules had to take over. Hercules agreed but said that he needed to put a pad on his shoulders first. Atlas foolishly agreed and took the world back. Having outsmarted Atlas, Hercules went on his way.

Even after scientists came up with explanations as to why earthquakes happen, many still held on to these age-old beliefs.


