





Each of us took a bite of our celery. "It's not bad," Mother whispered. It was more than good, it was delicious. When Mrs Gleason came around with the relish tray, we each took another stalk of celery, except my brother. He took two.

There was only one problem: long strings ran through the length of the stalk, and they caught in our teeth. When I helped my mother in the kitchen, I always pulled the string out before slicing the celery. We decided to pull the strings out of the stalk. Z-zip, z-z-zip. Suddenly, I realised that there was dead silence except for our 'zipping'. Looking up, I saw that the eyes of everyone in the room were on our family.

That was not the end of it. Mrs Gleason announced that dinner was served and invited us to the dining table. It was lavishly covered with platters of food, but we could not see any chairs around the table, so we helpfully carried over some dining chairs and sat down. All the other guests just stood there.

Mrs Gleason bent down and whispered to us, "This is a buffet dinner. You help yourselves to some food and eat it in the living room."

I began to relax.


