

Jacinta Negrelli, an environmental project manager in Australia, has become the sponsor of the 200,000th child currently supported through World Vision Australia, a non-profit organisation.

The milestone was celebrated in February when Jacinta met long-term supporter, Noela Hobbs who has been sponsoring children consistently since 1968, just two years after World Vision first opened an office in Australia. Both were presented with certificates of appreciation by World Vision.

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
Jacinta took out sponsorship of five-year-old Xiang Hong He after seeing a World Vision promotion during the recent Chinese New Year celebrations in Melbourne, a city in Australia.

"The idea to sponsor a child had always been at the back of my mind," said Jacinta. "I spotted this little girl's photograph among others at the promotion. I selected her as she has the same birthday as I."

Xiang Hong He lives in Yongsheng, a remote village in China's south western province of Yunnan. She is in pre-school and has one sister. Her parents are farmers and through Jacinta's sponsorship, the family will receive the costs of Xiang's school supplies and uniforms. Their community will also receive funds for school buildings, road repairs, health services and other facilities. World Vision Australia's project in Yongsheng began in March 1998 and currently assists 300 children and their families.

Noela Hobbs currently sponsors four children and has sponsored a total of 22 in an unbroken, 32-year relationship with World Vision. She has no children and to her, her sponsored kids are her very own.

World Vision child sponsorship began with modest numbers. It climbed to 50,000 by 1981 and then 100,000 just eight years later. The 150,000 mark was achieved in 1995. By February 1999, the 200,000 milestone has already been reached, sponsored by 177,497 Australian individuals, corporations and families.

I came from a poor family. My father was a factory worker who supported my mother and my two younger sisters with his meagre income. Life was hard for the family and I was determined to give my parents a better life. I worked very hard in my studies to do well in my 'A' Level examinations. Then I served my National Service before I went to the university.

However, my dreams were shattered when I was studying in the National University of Singapore. In September 2010, I was diagnosed with kidney failure. It all happened so suddenly. I was in a daze and then I plunged into depression. My parents were in despair when they saw how the illness had affected me. What could they do? I could no longer concentrate on my studies and often felt tired. I lost a lot of weight and was in low spirits. My parents tried their best to conceal their pain from me but I could see the look of sadness on their faces.

I turned to my friends for support. They rallied round me which gave me great comfort. Still, it was I who had to bear the torment of the illness. Many times, I felt angry with myself. I could still remember the frequent nights when I used to get up and sob alone. The words reverberated, "Why me? Why me?" I had no answer.

The doctor told me that dialysis was the only way to keep me alive. It would cost two thousand dollars per month to sustain me and I had to go for dialysis sessions at least three times a week. My father exhausted his savings, and then borrowed from friends and relatives to pay my medical fees. He even thought about selling the family flat. I felt that it was better for me to die rather than be a burden to my family and everyone. I gave up on life.

It was this moment of my life that the National Kidney Foundation (NKF) came to my rescue. In February 2010, was admitted into the NKF dialysis programme at low affordable fees. NKF nurses and social workers counselled me and gave me the resolve to fight the rejection and depression which all kidney patients faced – the feeling that they were totally useless to anyone.

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After going through dialysis for five years, an anonymous donor came forth to donate his kidney. Even though I have to take anti-rejection medications for the rest of my life to prevent my body from rejecting the new kidney, I am glad that I can be finally freed from the frequent and painful dialysis sessions. My life changed day by day with the support I received as I found renewed determination to rebuild my life. It was like I was given a second chance to live again. I could only thank my lucky stars.

My illness has taught me something about the nature of humanity, love and relationships that I never understood, and probably never would have. So, from that standpoint, there is some truth and good in everything.
