I am considering putting a sign 'Beware of Wild Animal'. Now 25-months old, my younger son Lucien is engaging in random acts of physical abuse after his second birthday. One day, he was the angel, much praised by all for his sweet temper and ability to sit still for ages in his high chair. The next day, he had morphed into a feisty little devil, tearing around at top speed and taking delight in hitting anything in his path.

When we go out, he would try to kick everything in sight: walls, doors and even an old friend who had bent down to say hello to him. In public, he would slap unsuspecting younger children if they try to muscle in his territory.

He would walk up to his elder brother, Julian, who would be watching television innocently and give him a hard smack across the face. He even smilingly gave his grandmother a thump on the nose when she tried to kiss him goodbye.

The supportive spouse and I were flummoxed. Are we going to receive irate calls from his teachers and other parents about how our gongfu-kicking son had roughed up his classmates? Both the supportive spouse and I do not believe in corporal punishment. Naturally, Lucien's violence is in no way intentional or malicious. He simply does not yet understand that these acts are wrong.

The two boys do fight, tussle over toys and get scrappy with each other from day to day and I suspect Lucien picked up some of his moves from his brother when we were not looking. Hence, I have enforced a strict 'Do Not Hit Your Brother' policy on Julian. Should he flout the rule, he would be made to stand in his time-out corner to reflect on the folly and undesirability of his actions.

It struck me that the message had to be delivered to Lucien too. Telling him 'No' or 'You're naughty' each time he hit someone has had limited effect. We designated another spot in the house as Lucien's 'naughty corner'. When he hit Julian again, we issued him the command to stop and promptly picked him up and moved him to the 'naughty corner' for a few seconds to a minute.

The first few times we did this, he cried piteously. However, after a few more cycles, his 'assault' on his brother lessened. It took constant reinforcing but the message seems to have sunk in.

Stopping Lucien from hitting however, involves a two-pronged strategy. I realised that most of the time, he lashed out with his hands and feet when he wanted our attention. He was struggling to find the words or the right way to articulate what he wanted to tell us. The way to get around this, is to teach him alternative ways of getting us to respond - such as with soft taps and strokes. As his vocabulary increases, his reliance on physical gestures to communicate his frustration would hopefully lessen. The rest of the family, too, can make him understand better that hitting others is just not on.

When Sarubai Salve walks through her village, she gathers a crowd. Salve is 56, a slim, reserved, somewhat stern woman with glasses and long black hair streaked with grey. On most days she sets off twice, at nine in the moming and six at night, through the streets of Jawalke, a village of about 240 families in the central part of India's Maharashtra state. She carries a blood-pressure cuff, a stethoscope, a baby scale and a thin logbook. 5 She is often accompanied by Babai Sathe, an exuberant woman of 47, a bit zaftig, with a toothy smile. The two of them are responsible for keeping Jawalke healthy under the Aroles programme. They deliver babies and then visit them. They take blood pressure and check on villagers cured of leprosy.

When Salve and Sathe started their work in Jawalke, they were destitute. As members of the Untouchable caste, they were considered nonpersons, so revited that the high caste people would throw out food if it even touched the edge of their saris. They went barefoot in the village, as Untouchable women were not allowed to wear shoes. Sathe remembers standing for hours at the local water pump - which she could not touch - waiting for a high caste woman to take pity on her and fill up her bucket. Salve was so poor that she washed her hair with mud and owned a single sari. When she laundered it, she had to stay in the river until it dried.

As the Aroles expanded their programme to more villages outside Jamkhed, they encouraged villages to select women from low castes. "An educated woman is likely to come from a high caste. She may not want to work for the poorest of the poor," says Arole.

20 The Aroles believed that empathy, knowledge of how poor people live, and willingness to work were more important than skills and prestige.

Many of the selected village health workers were completely illiterate when they began training. Sathe herself had never attended a day of school. Salve had completed fourth grade. Sathe was married at the age of twelve; Salve at ten. Every worker was married by the age of thirteen. Many had been abandoned by their husbands. Others talked about terrible beatings. Sathe recounted how her husband had thrown her down a well after bearing him a daughter. Her parents would not allow her to go home. "You must suffer whatever he gives you. That is Indian culture," they said.

When the health workers first came for their training, they felt that a woman had no intelligence. Once, they were asked, "Who is more intelligent – a woman or a rat?" They answered, 'A rat is more intelligent than a woman.' Thus, the first thing the trainers did was to start them off with the practice of saying their names in front of a mirror. Will their self-esteem ever be restored? One can only hope.


