

Lee Wung Yew's career spans two Olympics, five Asian Games and eleven SEA Games. He is a two-time Sportsman of the Year (1989, 1997), with one Asian Games bronze in the trophy cabinet, along with fifteen SEA Games gold. The 42-year-old shooter has been in the sport for twenty-six years, but only since March last year has he enjoyed training with one of the best coaches in the business.

Lee is one of the twenty-four athletes that come under Project 0812 – a Government initiative to provide elite Singapore athletes with all the support necessary to give them the best chance possible to win a medal at the 2008 and/or 2012 Olympics. He has been training with world-renown Italian coach Marcello Dradi for the last ten months.

With less than seven months to the Beijing Olympics, he is entering the final curve in his preparations and is determined to do better than his performances in Atlanta 1996 and Athens 2004, when he was eliminated after the first round. Coach Dradi wants his protégé to make it into the Olympics final.

"Dradi believes in my potential," says Lee. "He's able to pick on what I'm 1 doing well and is quick to stamp out my weak areas. I used to emphasise tee much the outcome and my scores, but I've shifted my focus to my execution and technique."

The next few months will be intense for Lee. The Physical Education teacher at Inova Junior College will have two training stints in Italy, one in March and another in May. He will need to use the rest of the months to get into peak condition because the level of competition at the 2008 Games will be the highest ever encountered.

"I believe it will take a world record to win the gold medal in Beijing," says Dradi.


