Activity Descriptions

♦ **Rock Climbing Challenge**

Rock climbing is an activity in which climbers climb up, down or across natural rock formations or artificial rock walls. The goal is to reach the top of a natural or artificial rock wall without falling. Rock climbing is a physically and mentally demanding activity that develops a climber's strength, endurance and balance.

To ensure that participants learn safely, proper climbing techniques are taught and special equipment is used. This course is suitable for participants without previous experience in rock climbing.

♦ **Pottery Fun**

Pottery is generally considered to be containers made from clay. "Pot" is a term used for any kind of container. The word "pot" comes from the Old English word, "potian", which means "to push". Hence, pottery is a skill where an artist pushes and forms clay into pots or other structures.

Learn how to operate a specialised potter's wheel to mould containers and pots, as well as cartoon characters or fantasy figurines. Develop your fine motor skills and patience. Learn an interesting new skill and make something with your very own hands in this course!

♦ **Chinatown Trail**

Find out how Chinese immigrants contributed to the shaping of Singapore. Chinatown is an estate located largely in the central region of Singapore. Sir Stamford Raffles allocated the whole area west of the Singapore River to form a Chinese settlement. Let Singapore Hikers & Walkers lead you in exploring Chinatown – Singapore's largest Historic District.

Learn about Chinese culture, clothing, food and history on this unique walking trail beginning from Maxwell Road to Keong Saik Street. At the end of this activity, a sumptuous dinner at Chinatown awaits.

♦ **Mount Faber Nature Trail**

Mount Faber is located in the Bukit Merah area in the central region of Singapore. Standing at 106 metres above sea level, it was originally known as Telok Blangah Hill. It was renamed Mount Faber in July 1845 after Charles Edward Faber. Singapore Hikers & Walkers, who are experts in all things regarding Mount Faber, will share more about its history and lead you in exploring the unique flora and fauna as you hike with them in this activity.

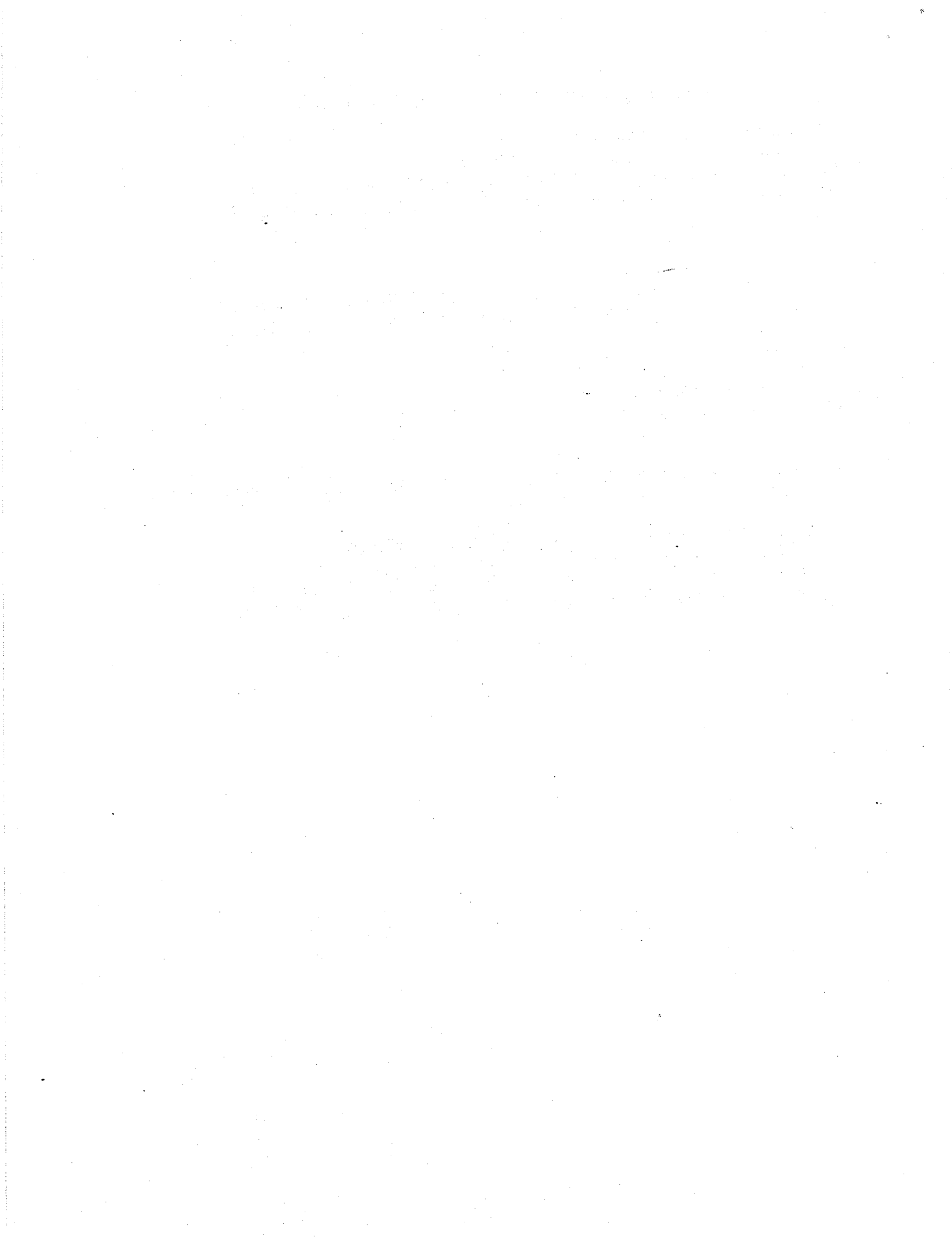

That rid him of extra weight and he started swimming in the direction the *Sea Robin* had gone. As lightning began flashing all around him, he envisioned someone going to his home and telling his wife and children that he had been lost at sea. "No way! I can't let them down," he told himself. The thought helped push him on. 10 15

After more than an hour of swimming, Damien was exhausted. As a huge wave swelled and lifted him up, he could hardly believe his eyes: the *Sea Robin* was just a few metres away!" As the boat neared, Damien could see Mike looking out tensely at him. Mike threw a life jacket and a rope to him. Hugging the life jacket close to his chest like a float, Damien then held tightly onto the rope. Relieved, he felt himself being pulled towards the side of the boat. 20

Mike hauled Damien onto the boat and knew immediately there was something wrong with Damien. Damien collapsed in pain as his muscles contracted wildly. Mike knew that Damien was in danger of heart failure and needed medical treatment critically. Alarmed, Mike radioed for a rescue basket to hoist Damien to the helicopter which he could see approaching. 25

The choppy sea now posed another problem. The helicopter could not land the basket within reach of Mike's outstretched hands. The high waves and constant rocking motion made landing with precision difficult.
