



Every year we read about cases of people drowning and perhaps three-fourths of these occur in public places where rescue is possible. There are probably other people nearby who could help but fail to do so, either because they do not know what to do or because they are afraid that the swimmer, struggling to save 5 himself, might pull them under. Bystanders could be lifesavers if they make use of the simple things usually found at hand. Consider the spare tyre. Roll it into the water, and even with the heavy steel wheel in the centre, it will rise to the surface and float. The drowning swimmer or swimmers can hang onto it. If everyone keeps his shoulders under water, the tyre will support six or seven persons. If the 10 swimmer is far from shore, you can swim out to him, pushing the spare tyre ahead of you. You will be in no danger yourself. For you too, can rest on the tyre if necessary. Various other objects usually present on a family outing can be used in a similar way. If you have a five-litre thermos flask, empty it, replace the lid, then 15 toss the flask to a tired swimmer. It will actually buoy him up a bit, and he may be able to paddle his way to safety. Other floatable and potentially lifesaving objects found around most pools and beaches include air mattresses, beach balls, inflated toy floats and even wooden tables and benches. Anyone, including non-swimmers, can push these 20 objects to victims who are not far from shore. If none of these objects is available, and a swimmer in trouble is near the shore, you may be able to save the victim by reaching out your hand to him. You can extend your reach by using a broom, an oar, a towel, or an article of clothing. If you wade in, stand with feet apart so you will not be pulled off-25 balance. Should you decide to swim out to the drowning person, take a stick or towel or some other object with you so the victim will clutch that object, not you. Remember, everyone can be a 'lifeguard' and life preservers are **30** everywhere.

When I regained consciousness, the first thing I was aware of was a sharp pain in my left leg. I turned to look at it and found that it was badly bruised. Then I looked around me and in a flash, everything came back vividly to my mind...the last moments when my plane swayed and plunged downwards, bursting into flames and my desperate escape by the parachute. I remembered that my touching ground had been accompanied by a most painful sensation and then I lost consciousness 5

Wearily, I pulled off the strings that still attached me to the parachute, now torn and limp.

My first thought was of safety. I was sure that lurking among the trees and bushes were wild animals that would make short work of me. There was no weapon on me except a small penknife.

I tried to climb a tree so as to make myself less exposed to danger and to be better able to spot any sign of human life. Aborigines if they were around might give me protection and food until 10 rescue came.

The thought of food made me become conscious of how ravenously hungry I was. It was clear to me that if I had nothing to eat soon, I would not be able to go on for long. I limped about, scanning the leafy branches of the trees hopefully. After walking a little distance, I found a clump that I recognised as yam plants. Quickly, I pulled out a clump and was delighted to find some fairly 15 big yams. I also found some rain water trapped in a large leaf, shaped like a cup. Thus I was able to have dinner.

My first night in the jungle was the most terrifying. Added to my feelings of pain and misery was the utmost fear that at any moment a wild animal might come upon me and devour me.

My thoughts continued with increasing alarm. I tried to forget the danger and to think about pleasant things instead. I thought about my family and about my safe little home.

I got up very late the next morning. The sun was high in the sky, so I got up quickly and started to walk along the river bank. I poked my stick into the undergrowth. Then I took a step or two. I had to be very careful and watch out for hidden snakes and spiders. I listened to the sounds of danger but I also listened to the sound of the birds.

"The sound of birds can tell you something about the jungle," my mother once told me. "Listen to them."
