



My family and I arrived at the refugee camp after my father's death in the war. We were allocated an area where we built our home out of plastic sheets and wooden planks. We soon settled in and were looking forward to a new beginning when the Vietnamese bombing disrupted the camp. We ran for our lives and in the chaos, I was separated from them.

I kept walking even after the sun had set. The sky was still tinged with gold, but I knew that soon everything would be swallowed up in the darkness and my visibility would be affected. I would have to stop searching for my family.

In the fading light, I could make out the silhouettes of all the tall watch towers in the distance, rising on the-ter bamboo stilts above the deserted land. I kept heading 10 towards them since they marked where the Nong Chan Refugee Camp was.

It was already dark when I reached the watch towers. Scattered campfires had been lit near them, as if we, refugees, found it reassuring to be sheltering near these landmarks. Parents and children stayed together, thankful to have each other. The women sorted out their leftover belongings, mumbling prayers of thanks. Many others 15 had not bothered to build a fire, but had just clustered on the ground, sleeping under the open sky. I wondered what Mother was doing now. She would be worried about me but at least, she had Sarun, Nea and Grandpa.

Tomorrow, I promised myself, I would go on looking. Tomorrow I would find them.

For now, the tree in front of me looked old and solid. I lay down under it and felt for the 20 marble in my shirt packet. Immediately, I was comforted by it. It was there, smooth and round. I took it out and with it in my hand, I fell asleep.

When I woke up, it was afternoon. There were already people up and about, packing their bundles of clothes, ready to move on. I lingered around, eavesdropping on conversations. What I heard was disturbing. There was an air raid last night. Villages 25 were destroyed by the bombs, and it was expected to be carried out again. The men discussed this at great length but nobody seemed to have any clear sense of what to

do. What everyone did seem convinced about was that the fields here at Nong Chan would be unsafe for at least the next few days and that we should seek shelter elsewhere. Listening to this, I felt a stab of fear. It would be harder to find my family as 30 the next air raid would scatter us further apart.

My thoughts were interrupted by the rumbling engine of the lunch truck. The growl in my stomach suggested I should get some food. I approached the truck and that was where I saw the familiar wocden signpost! Forgotten were my hunger and sore feet, I wanted only to get home and throw myself into Mother's waiting arms. Almost 35 running, I headed towards the signpost and past the well, the one I had been searching for. I could hardly keep from laughing out loud as I ran the last stretch home.

It was then that I stopped. There was nothing there. All that was left were some wooden planks and torn plastic sheets. In my confusion and hopelessness, I heard a familiar voice. I turned around and saw Sarun waving at me. Tears welled in my eyes as 40 I ran towards him.


