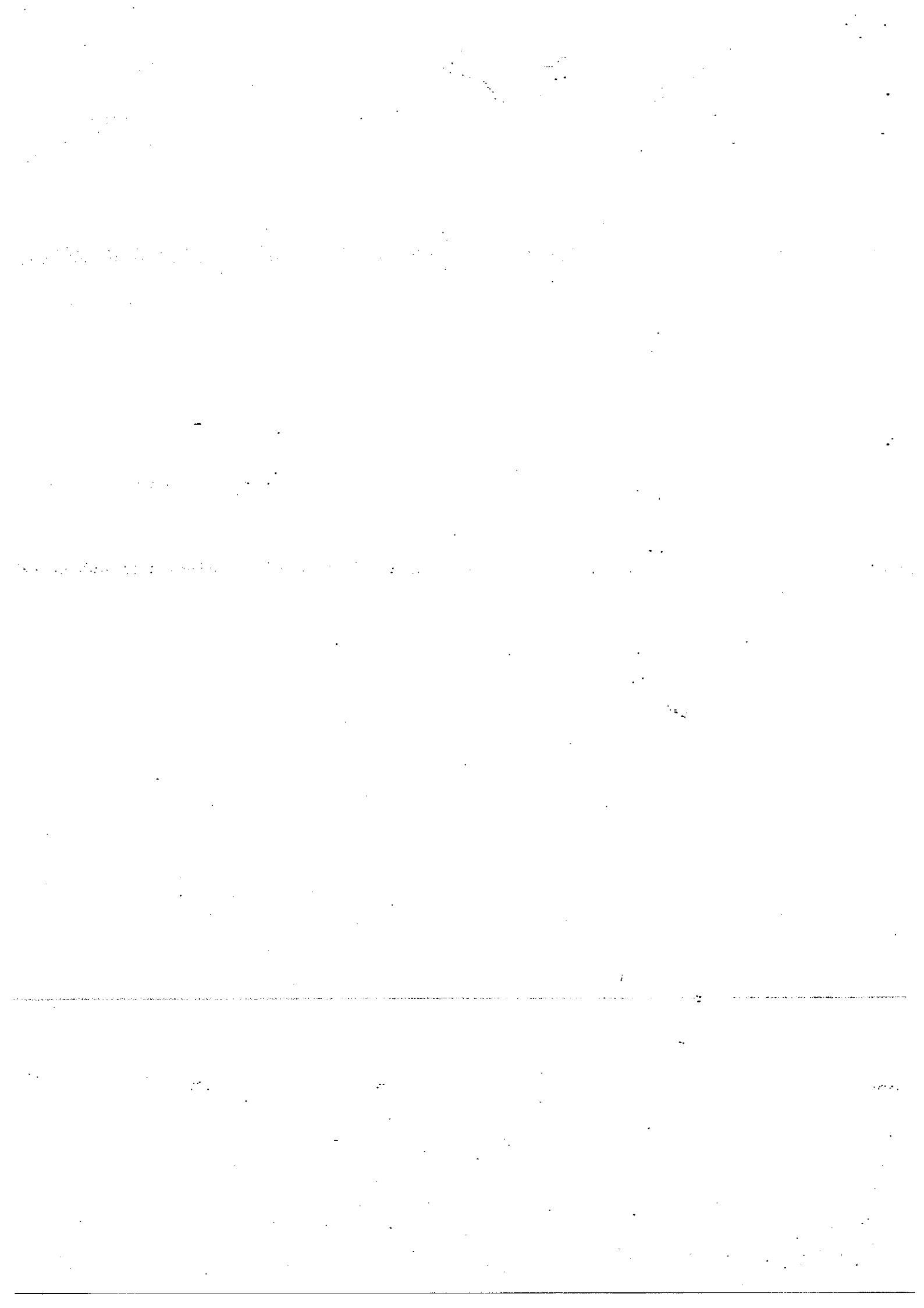

After the operation, Molly walked around on all four legs, as if nothing had ever happened to her. Now, with every step she takes, she stamps a smile in the dirt. She leaves her mark in other ways too.

Kaye Harris took Molly to the prosthesis centre. There were children there who, like Molly, had artificial limbs. When the children saw Molly, they were amazed. Molly made them smile and gave them hope. Soon, Molly began to visit schools, nursing homes, army bases and hospitals. A book was even written about Molly!

Molly has become a symbol of hope for people of all ages. Her story leaves a smile on people's faces, just as clearly as her horseshoe leaves a mark in the sand.
