World War II was coming to an end in the Philippines. In our small village in Botolan, Zambales, life was returning to something like normal. I left my village in June 1945 to start a new life in Manila. In 1959, I attended a three-month UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation) - sponsored community development course in Mysore City, India. Participants came from Africa, Asia and Scandinavia.

Entering the living quarters, I was dismayed to discover that my roommate was a Japanese man. Even before we were introduced to each other (his name was Kei Kiriake), I felt a thick invisible barrier had sprung up between us. Unbidden, memories of war stirred in my mind.

I recalled the Japanese soldier who had looted our house. Finding no money or valuables, he had grabbed my father and pressed the cutting edge of his bayonet to his neck. Mother fainted as a result.

In desperation, I recalled that rank-and-file soldiers feared the Kempetai, the Japanese military police. I told the soldier that I studied in the Japanese-run school and my teacher, Ino San, was an officer in the Kempetai. "I'll go see him now," I said, speaking the "Nippon-go" I had learned in school.

The brutish lout lifted his bayonet. My gamble had worked.

Now, more than 15 years later, I could barely tell the difference between the soldier who had almost killed my father and Kei - they were both Japanese and they both deserved my contempt. I was rude and inconsiderate to Kei, conveying my hatred in many different ways. Meeting each other, I wrinkled my nose, indicating that I did not like his smell. I called him "Bowlegged San" to his face.

One evening, Kei was writing a letter while I sat on my bed reading. Our room was silent, as usual, but I was itching to challenge him for the atrocities committed by his countrymen. "Can we talk?" I asked.

He stopped writing and for the first time, we faced each other squarely. I bluntly told him about the atrocities committed by his countrymen during their three-year occupation of the Philippines. My hate list was endless.

Throughout the whole tirade, Kei maintained a respectful silence. When I was through, he took a bundle of pictures from his suitcase and laid them on the table. They were photos of Japanese survivors of the atomic bomb - people who were reduced to skin, protruding bones and horrible deformities of all types.

Kei told me that he was a 13-year-old boy in Hiroshima when the bomb was dropped. Unlike almost half the city's population, he somehow survived the blast.

Like most post-war Filipinos, I believed that we had a monopoly on the ills and misfortunes of war. After hearing Kei's story and seeing his photos, the myth was shattered - the Japanese had had their share of misfortunes too. I realised that there are no victors in war, only victims.

Herrick, the rescue pilot, had to make sure that the helicopter was close enough to get near *Kawa*, but far enough so that the yacht would not be hit. It was adrift in high waves and strong winds. Cold and exhausted, Horgan, who started his solo journey from Tahiti, was in deep distress by the time the helicopter arrived. The 63-year-old sailor had lost control of his yacht as there was a power failure. He had no option but to use a hand-held radio to inform the coastguard. Unable to steer the yacht, Horgan was stranded at sea.

Smith, the paramedic, put on his harness and waited. Taylor had to turn a metal chain to let Smith slowly down to the yacht. The trio discussed and felt that the helicopter was in danger of hitting the mast. "Listen, you need to get yourself away from this yacht," Taylor shouted to Smith. They then instructed Horgan to lower his life raft and paddle away from the yacht. Soon, Taylor lowered Smith to the waters. The paramedic swam towards Horgan who was in the life raft. He put a harness around Horgan and attached it to his own. However, what happened next was unexpected. Confused by fear, cold and fatigue, Horgan turned back to the yacht, attempting to throw his leg over the side of the yacht. As a result, his harness was entangled with the rope between the yacht and the life raft. The tangled mess worsened as the waves hit the yacht.

Both of them were pounded against the yacht. Smith had bruises all over. Over and over again, Smith tried to convince Horgan to let go but to no avail. After 15 minutes, Horgan suddenly went limp. To Smith, it looked like Horgan had drowned or just given up. As Horgan slipped out of the harness, he floated away from the yacht and the tangled ropes. Finally, Smith was able to free himself. Just as he was engulfed by the next wave, Taylor pulled him up in the nick of time. Within seconds, Smith was back in the safety of the helicopter.

Herrick informed his colleagues that they had little fuel left and feared for their survival. However, the men decided to complete their mission. Within seconds, Taylor lowered Smith down again. The paramedic swam over and grabbed Horgan's leg. Horgan did not struggle and Smith managed to get the hamess over his head. They were swiftly pulled out of the water. Back in the helicopter, Smith helped Horgan to regain consciousness.

Eventually, they arrived back at base with just a few minutes of fuel remaining. Horgan was rushed to a nearby hospital. Upon recovery, he was full of praise for his rescuers. "They didn't give up on me when I had given up on myself," Horgan told journalists after his ordeal. In May 2012, Herrick, Taylor and Smith received the New Zealand Search and Rescue Council's highest awards for their bravery on the mission to rescue Horgan.
